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# 1. INTRODUCTION

This report refers to quarter 1 of the financial year 2008/2009 (01/04/2008 – 30/06/2008).

Performance with our Platform for Success identifies the Force mission and the strategy for delivering it throughout 2008/2009. The Force mission is being achieved through the Control Strategy Priorities addressing crime and disorder issues and Business Strategy Priorities which ensure the infrastructure and organisation are best suited to deliver the needs of the public and other stakeholders:

- Child Protection
- Community Focus
- Community Well-Being
- Controlled Drugs
- Corporate Governance
- Criminal Justice
- Force Reputation & Standards
- National Security
- Offender Management
- Public Satisfaction
- Road Casualty Reduction
- Serious & Violent Crime
- Staff Potential

Grampian Police has adopted the National Intelligence Model and utilised this with Intelligence Led Policing. This ensures there are focus, direction and purpose to achieving results on our priorities. Above all, this and the Total Community approach help focus activity on local crime trends, so that well informed decisions can be made to deploy Police resources in the most effective way to combat issues affecting local communities.

This report is structured around the four 'areas of policing' identified within the Scottish Policing Performance Framework (SPPF), i.e. Service Response, Public Reassurance & Community Safety, Criminal Justice and Tackling Crime, and Sound Governance and Efficiency. Together, these represent the full range of policing related activities of Grampian Police and its partners. The Control Strategy Priorities are aligned to this framework.

The data contained within this report is based on fiscal year quarters.

The aim of the Police in Moray is to improve the quality of life for the residents of and visitors to the Moray area by reducing the level of reported crime, tackling anti social behaviour and increasing the detection of reported crime.

## **MORAY DIVISION**

For crime recording and overall supervision, Moray Division is split into Inspector Areas, where a Police Inspector is responsible for the day to day running of each area. These areas are as follows:

- **Buckie Inspector Area (Inspector Derek Spark)**
  - Buckie, Cullen, Keith and surrounding rural areas
- **Elgin Inspector Area (Inspector Colin Mowat)**
  - Elgin and rural areas around Elgin
- **Forres Inspector Area (Inspector Craig Donald)**
  - Forres, Aberlour, Rothes, Dufftown, Tomintoul and rural areas around these towns
- **Lossiemouth Inspector Area (Inspector Alistair Robertson)**
  - Lossiemouth, Hopeman, Burghead, Lhanbryde, Fochabers and rural areas around these towns.

## **TARGETS AND 'TRAFFIC LIGHTS'**

Where appropriate, targets have been set by the Force for certain indicators. These targets are based on:

- The baseline - set from the average of the past three years performance data.
- An aspirational value - based on the best figure during the past three years.

Where these are applied the following traffic light system is used:

Best Ever (Aspirational)	
Above Average (Baseline)	
Below Average	

Performance highlighted in green is classified as excellent, representing an improvement in our best quarterly performance over the last three years.

Performance highlighted in amber is classified as good performance, indicating that the results achieved exceed the average overall performance over the last three years.

Performance which falls below the baseline is highlighted in red.

Due to continuous improvement within the Force and ongoing excellent levels of performance during the past three years, this means that targets for 2008/2009 are increasingly challenging due to previous excellent performance driving up both the average (baseline) and the best ever (aspirational) targets.

It is anticipated that this challenging regime will result increasingly in more targets being categorised as amber. This still provides evidence of good performance.

## HIGHLIGHTS

## FORCE HIGHLIGHTS

The Force has sustained a good level of performance during the first quarter of the current financial year. As a consequence of three successful years the Force has now set higher targets to achieve in 2008/2009 which we regularly meet and exceed.

**Crimes of Violence**

Comparing quarter 1 of the current year with same period last year, the number of Group 1 Crimes of Violence fell by 7 crimes and detections rose to 72.5%. A new protocol for the investigation of robberies in Aberdeen is thought to have contributed to recorded crimes of robbery falling to 41 across the quarter, the lowest level compared to the 8 previous quarters. Robbery detections were 53.7% compared to 45.3% in the same period last year.

**Crimes of Indecency**

The introduction of the Prostitution (Public Places) (Scotland) Act 2007 led to the Force undertaking a proactive approach to tackle antisocial aspects of prostitution in Aberdeen City Centre, leading to a rise in offences to 298 (267 in same quarter last year). The detection rate for all crimes of indecency has increased to 82.9%, higher than any quarter in 2006/2007 and 2007/2008.

**Crimes of Dishonesty**

Crimes of dishonesty peaked in quarter 1 over the past 2 years and did so again this year with 4339 crimes, albeit 752 fewer than in quarter 1 last year. The detection rate rose to 39.1%, the highest of any quarter over the last 2 years.

**Vandalism, Fireraising, Malicious and Reckless Conduct**

A two year high detection rate of 35.2% was also achieved for Group 4 crimes which includes Vandalism, a focus under the Force Priority of Community Well-Being. The number of crimes in this group fell to 2506, a decrease of 4.9% compared to the previous quarter, with the detection rate for Vandalism rising to 34.8% the highest of the last 3 years.

**Other Crimes**

An increase in Group 5 crimes was largely driven by pro-active policing particularly relating to drugs. The 1581 offences are on a par with most quarters in 2007/2008 and the detection rate of 94% is likely to increase as laboratory results come through for drugs offences.

**Miscellaneous Offences**

Proactive policing and use of legislation to target antisocial behaviour has resulted in an increase in quarter 1 of 5.7%, with an additional 275 offences in Group 6 crimes (miscellaneous offences) being recorded. These offences include Petty Assault, Breach of the Peace, Urinating and other disorderly conduct.

**Community Focus**

Work on the Community Focus priority included a second conference of faith groups to explore how they can improve and contribute to partnership working in the Total Community approach. Among the outcomes was the Force's first Key Individual Network (KIN) with 60 members. KINS are a new initiative by the Force to promote and enhance community engagement.

### ***Criminal Justice***

Contributions to improving the criminal justice process included the number of Antisocial Behaviour Fixed Penalty Notices (ASBFPNs) issued rising to 648, thus helping to lessen the burden on courts. Following an agreement between Aberdeen Division and the Aberdeen Procurator Fiscal (PF) to increase reporting of offenders on undertaking to appear in court for all crimes, an increase to 18.1% of these offenders was achieved, compared to 10.4% in the previous quarter.

This is a key part of the Force's contribution to shortening the time taken to dispense justice. Despite an 8% increase from the previous quarter in the number of reports submitted to the Procurator Fiscal, the percentage submitted within the target of 28 days remained above 96% over the same period.

### ***Record Police Numbers***

A new record level of 1509 police officers was achieved during the period with the number of female officers increasing to 24.1%. Police staff turnover is down slightly compared to the last 4 quarters.

## **MORAY DIVISION HIGHLIGHTS**

**Moray Division performance in the first quarter of 2008/2009 is showing a positive trend with a reduction in the majority of recorded priority crimes in the Division and an increase in the detection rates compared to the same quarter last year.**

### ***Crimes of Violence***

Although there is a slight increase in recorded crimes of violence in Moray Division this quarter compared to last year the detection for this crime type is very high with 100% detection rate for Attempted Murder charges and 75% detection rates for Assault and Robbery and Rape. This compares well with other Division of the Force. The numbers of recorded crimes of violence within Moray is low in comparison to other areas of Scotland.

### ***Crimes of Indecency***

A large proportion of the complaints dealt with in this crime category are historical and are reported to the Police, sometimes, several years after the offences were committed. Such an enquiry was carried out into a complaint of serious sexual assault which resulted in a male offender, who was a foster carer, being convicted of these crimes and sentenced to 12 years imprisonment. HMIE Child Protection Inspection is currently being carried out for Moray and will report at the beginning of 2009.

### ***Crimes of Dishonesty***

Recorded crimes of dishonesty in Moray for this quarter are down by 98 recorded crimes with an 8.8% increase in the detection rate which at 38.9% in the highest recorded since Quarter 4 of 2005/2006. Domestic housebreaking, commercial housebreaking and car crime in Moray for the first quarter of 2008/2009 are all showing significant reductions on the same period last year and increases in the number of crimes of this type being detected.

### ***Vandalism, Fireraising & Malicious and Reckless Conduct***

Recorded Vandalism offences in Moray Division has seen a 16% decrease compared to the same period last year with a 5.4% increase in the detection rate. There is an ongoing Police initiative within Moray to tackle recorded vandalism offences in the Division with a view to reducing the instances of reported vandalism and increase the detection rates for this crime type. This initiative has a number of strands and involves other agencies such as media and partnership working. It is also encouraging members of the public to report incidents of vandalism at an early stage to enable early intervention to address this issue which affects the quality of life of residents in Moray. Current trends indicate that this initiative is being successful in driving down recorded vandalism and detecting more offenders.

### ***Controlled Drugs***

The Division continues to target the supply of controlled drugs within Moray concentrating on the dealers in Class A drugs such as Heroin, Cocaine and Ecstasy. In cooperation with the Force Drugs Squad Operation Centaur was carried out this quarter tackling an organised crime group which resulted in the seizure of significant quantities of Class A drugs and money.

### ***Community Safety***

The Police in Moray continue to work with our other partners such as Moray Council, Grampian Fire and Rescue Service, NHS Grampian and Registered Social Landlords to address anti social behaviour in the area and to improve the quality of life for residents in Moray. The issue of underage drinking and youth annoyance is being tackled through enforcement and education. The Moray area has been the first in Scotland to issue a closure order in respect of a privately owned dwelling house regarding the anti social behaviour of the residents of that property.

### ***Criminal Justice***

The Division is using the issuing of anti social behaviour fixed penalties for minor offences to lessen the time officers have to spend compiling detailed reports and to free up court time. During this quarter a total of 85 fixed penalties have been issued in Moray.

### ***Road Casualty Reduction***

In common with other Divisions in the Force Moray officers through education and enforcement are attempting to made roads in Moray safer for all users. In the first quarter of 2008/2009 there were no fatal road accidents in the Division compared to 1 for the same period last year.

### ***Record Police Numbers***

In Moray Division there is currently 188 Police Officers and 68 Support staff. in post which is an all time high for the area.

## 2. SERVICE RESPONSE

The area of Service Response relates to how Grampian Police respond to the public, including the development of Total Community Policing, refining Force Service Centre capability, and prioritising public satisfaction.

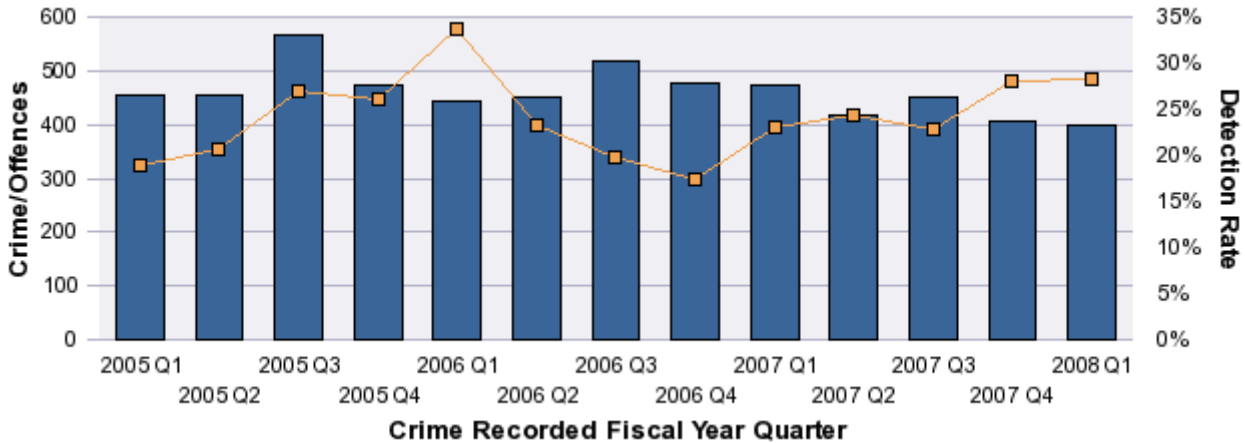

The targets set for the Division are based on previous Divisional performance hence the difference in the traffic lights for Divisional figures

- As can be seen from the table above, the number of incidents have mirrored the no of reported racist crimes with a crimefile being created for each incident and enquiry made into it.
- The number of racially aggravated crimes recorded Quarter 1 this year is currently 14 up from 10 for the corresponding quarter last year.
- The majority of racist incidents in this quarter all relate to verbal comments of a racist nature made by the accused towards the complainers and do not involve any form of violence.
- The detection rate has for Quarter 1 is currently 57.1% but this is likely to improve as there are racially aggravated crimes still in the enquiry stage.

- In quarter 1 2008/2009, the number of recorded crimes of Vandalism has decreased in Moray Division by 9.7% (76 fewer crimes) compared to the same quarter last year.
- The Forres Inspector area shows an increase of 16 in the number of recorded crimes of Vandalism compared to quarter 1 last year. All other Inspector areas have shown significant reductions.
- The detection rate for Moray Division in quarter 1 at 28.4% is 5.4% higher than the same period last year. This is the highest quarterly detection rate for any of the quarters since 01 April 2007.

- Although the Forres Inspector area was showing an increase in recorded vandalism crime it had the highest detection rate at 31.1% this quarter.
- The increase in the detection rate for vandalism in the Division is as a result of the proactive focus on this type of crime in all areas of the Division commencing 01 April 2008 as part of a vandalism initiative. This is being coordinated by Chief Inspector MacKenzie and will continue into the next quarter.

## ANTISOCIAL BEHAVIOUR

This section will include data on crimes, offences and STORM incidents which involve anti social behaviour and will also include data relative to Anti Social Behaviour Orders and Acceptable Behaviour Contracts.

Breach of the Peace, Wilful Fireraising, Drinking in a Public Place, Youth Disorder, Underage Drinking, Noise Complaints and Neighbour Disputes are closely linked to vandalism and other antisocial behaviour in the Division. The following table details the levels of these types of incidents and offences recorded in Moray Division for Quarter 1 2008/2009.

- 19 Calls have been made to Moray Council Anti Social Behaviour Helpline this quarter compared to 32 for the same quarter last year. 4 incidents have been reported through the Moray Council website compared to 6 last year and 75 complaints of anti social behaviour were made direct to Moray Council down from 90 in the same quarter last year.
- There were 60 acknowledgement letters sent out by Moray Council re Anti Social Behaviour in the period 1 April 2008 to 30 June 2008 compared to 66 for the same quarter last year.
- 3 Acceptable behaviour contracts were negotiated this quarter compared to 4 last year and 2 referrals were made during this quarter compared to 5 in the same period last year.

## Rowdy Behaviour

Rowdy behaviour has been defined as including the following crimes, Breach of the Peace, Urinating and Drunk and Incapable. The following statistics are for these crimes only which form part of the Moray Council Community Safety Strategy.

- For Moray Division as a whole, for all the above charges relating to rowdy behaviour in Quarter 1 of 2008/2009 there is an increase of 29 recorded charges compared to the same period last year.
- Small increases have also been recorded in the overall totals of the Elgin and Lossiemouth Inspector areas compared to the same period last year. No change in the Buckie area and a small decrease in the Forres Inspector area.

Two Operation Avons, were carried out this Quarter in Moray Division one of which was with other partner agencies. They targeted underage drinking and associated anti-social behaviour of youths under the substance misuse heading.

In total, 45 youths were spoken to, and 10 were found to be have been involved with alcohol in one of the following categories: possessing alcohol, to being under the influence, to being in the company of others who fitted the aforementioned categories, to being in the area where alcohol had been found secreted.

Alcohol was seized on several occasions being a combination of that found secreted, and that confiscated from youths.

There were 11 letters sent out re anti social behaviour in the period 1 April 2008 to 30 June 2008

9 letters were sent to parents regarding their children's' involvement in underage drinking in the last quarter. These covered range of actions from possessing alcohol, to being under the influence, to being in the company of others who fitted the aforementioned categories, to being in the area where alcohol had been found secreted.

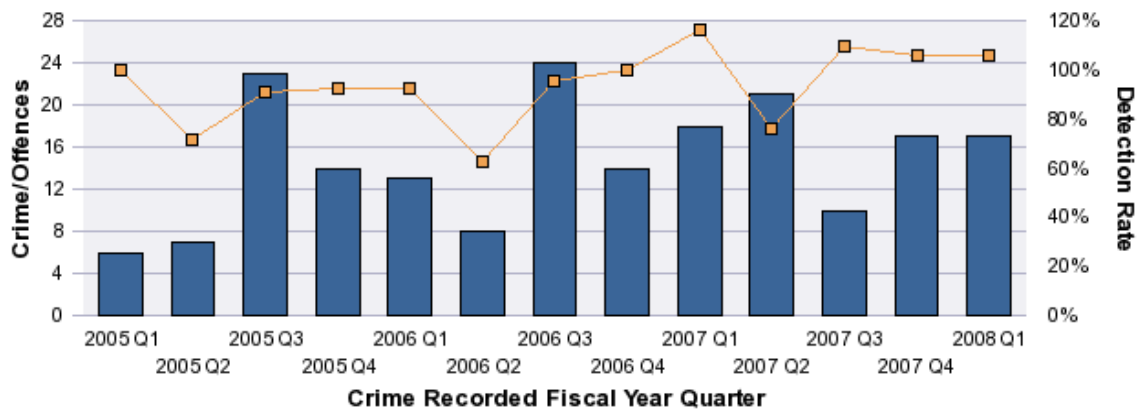

The Force Drug Squad continue to work with Divisional officers and liaise with them at every opportunity. A balance is being maintained to ensure targeting of the individuals most causing harm within communities as well as those significant individuals from Wolverhampton, Liverpool, and London. During the quarter a number of these individuals have been apprehended, along with others from the Force area, as a result of sustained enforcement activity, a number of these individuals have been removed from circulation.

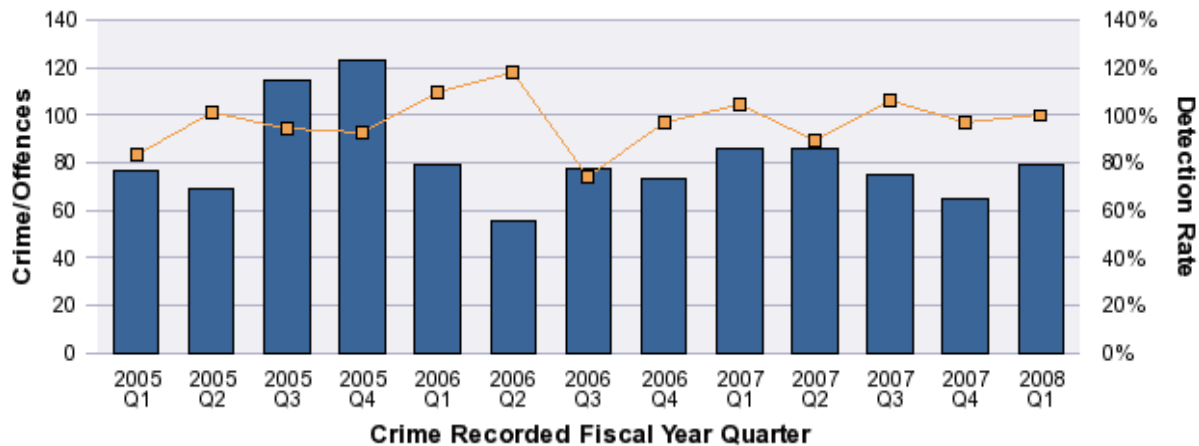

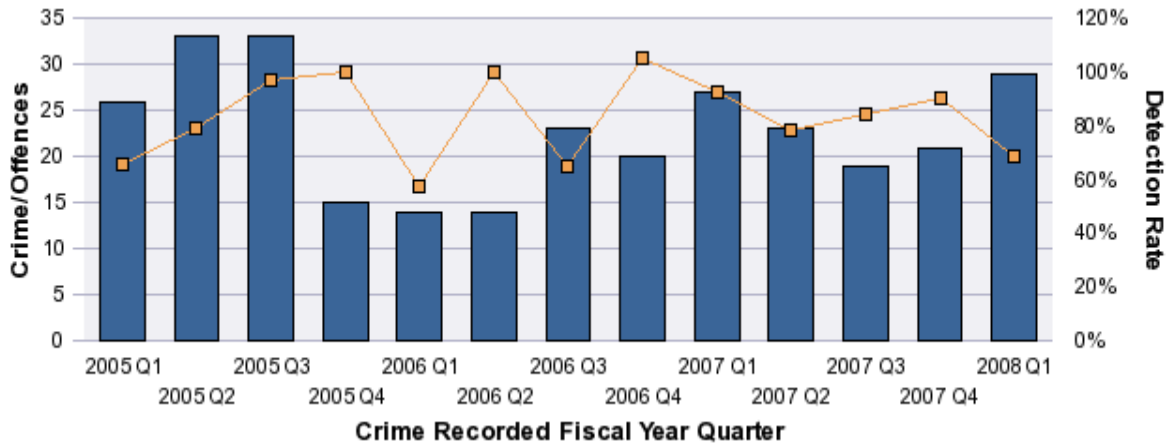

## LOCAL INFORMATION

Safer Scotland Knife Initiative - The initiative ran from 21 April until 18 May 2008. Bins were situated at Elgin, Buckie, Forres and Keith Police Offices and 82 knives were deposited by members of the public.

- ❑ School Watch - Leaflets and posters were produced and distributed to schools in Moray, encouraging pupils, teachers and parents to report any suspicious activity or vandalism occurring around schools during the holiday period.
- ❑ Moray Vandalism Initiative - Leaflets and posters were produced highlighting the initiative and promoting the text 'vandal' 0773 993 4444 number.
- ❑ Information Cards - These cards offer information on where to find help and advice on such issues as alcohol and drug abuse, domestic violence and anger management. They are designed to be distributed to persons who have come to the attention of the Police as a result of any of the above issues and have been distributed Moray wide.
- ❑ Moray Pubwatch - New Moray Pubwatch Scheme Intelligence Sharing Protocols were developed, to ensure freer exchange of information between members while ensuring Management of Police Information compliance.
- ❑ Test Purchasing of Alcohol Operation - This operation involved several off sales premises in Keith, Forres and Buckie, in response to intelligence that youths were purchasing alcohol.

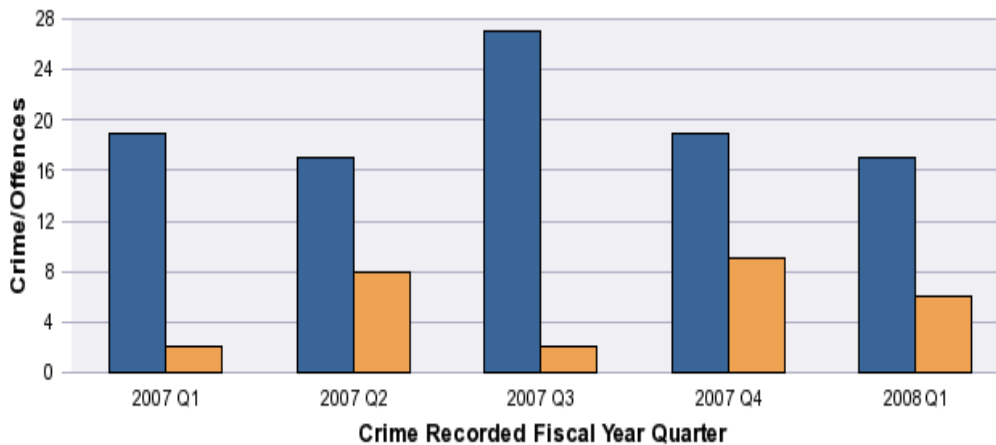

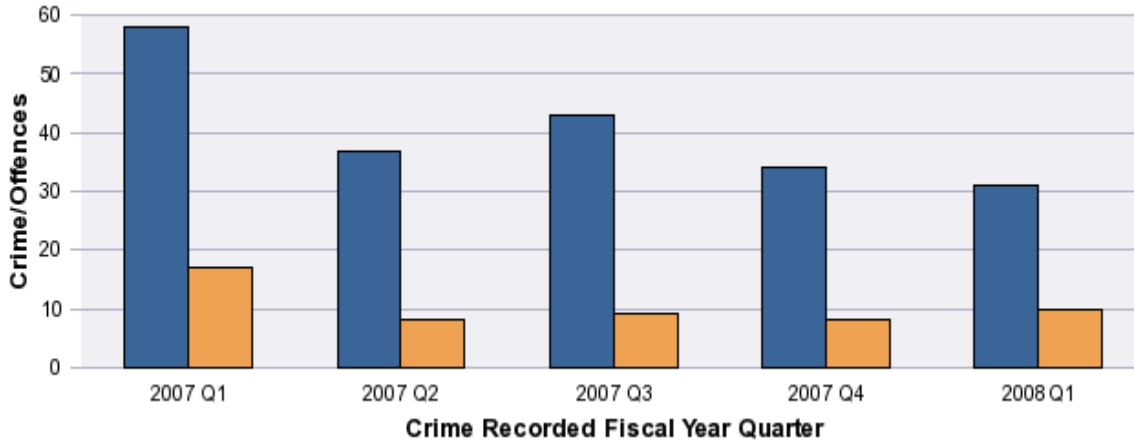

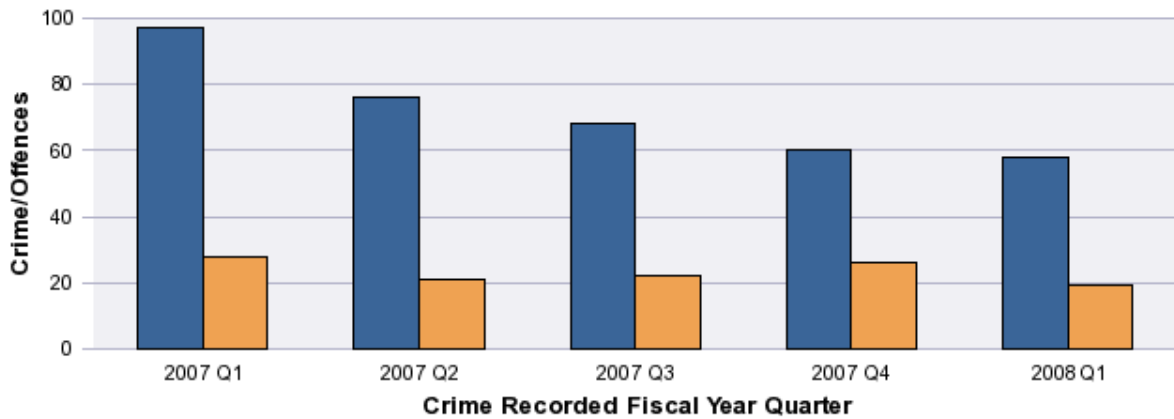
