	To ensure that regeneration outcomes are embedded in the Single Outcome Agreement approach.
	Community Planning Partnerships are central to ensuring that the right people and communities are involved in decisions about the public services that affect them and that the right connections, including regional and national connections, are in place to deliver positive local outcomes. The Scottish Government looks to Community Planning Partnerships to work across and disrespect the boundaries between public services to deliver the right positive outcomes for their locality.
Moray Health and	The MHSCP is working to improve health and reduce inequalities.

	In particular the College will assist in the delivery of the economic strategy, attainment and qualifications of the residents and supporting national priorities such as 16+ learning.
Third Sector Interface	The recently formed company plays a vital role in the development of the local social economy, through advice and support to the voluntary and community sector, the development of volunteering and by providing support and development of Social Enterprises in Moray.
HITRANS	The Highlands & Islands Transport Partners (HITRANS) is the statutory regional transport partnership covering Eileen Sear (Western Isles), Orkney, Highland, Moray and most of the Argyll and Bute area.
