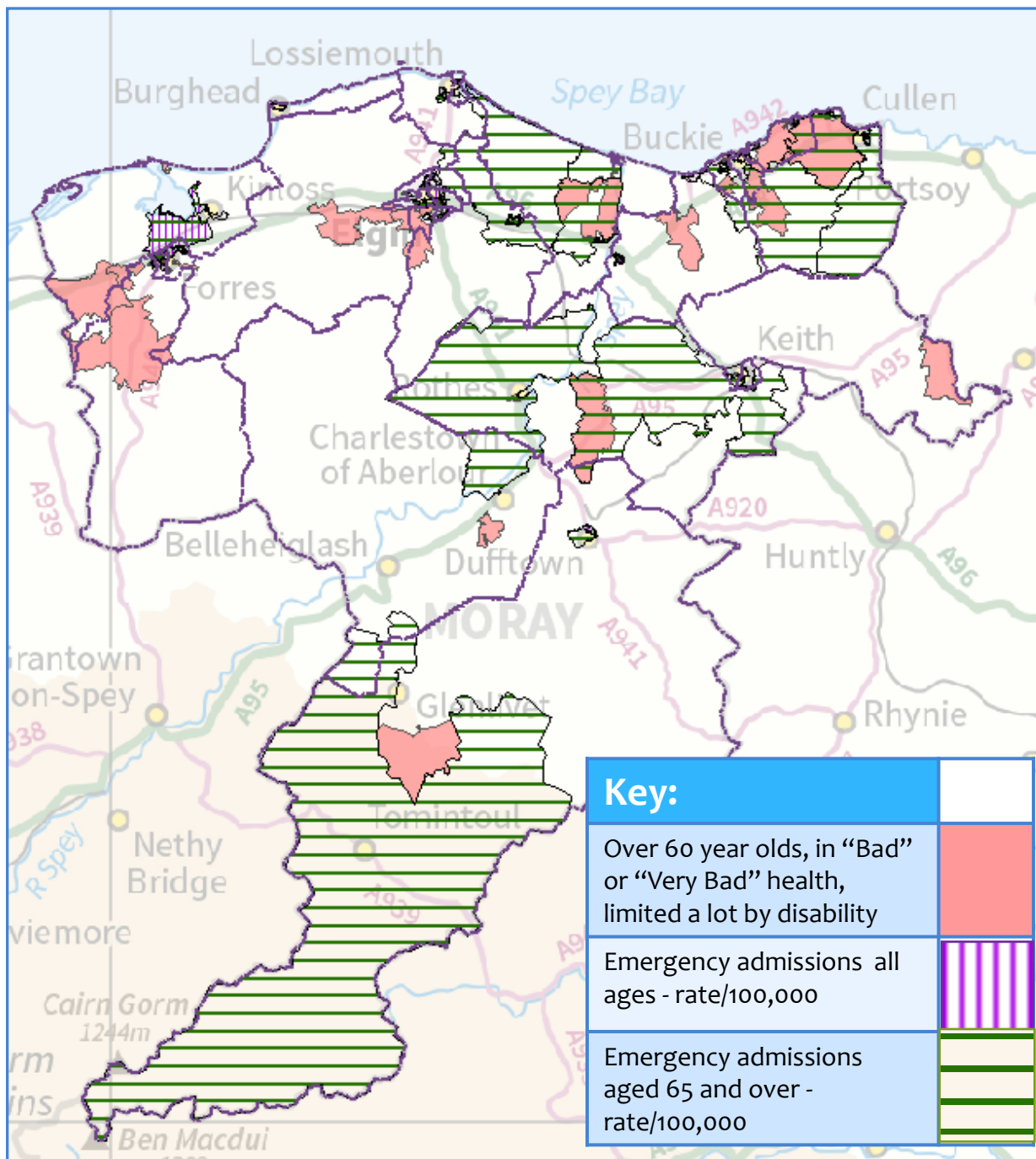

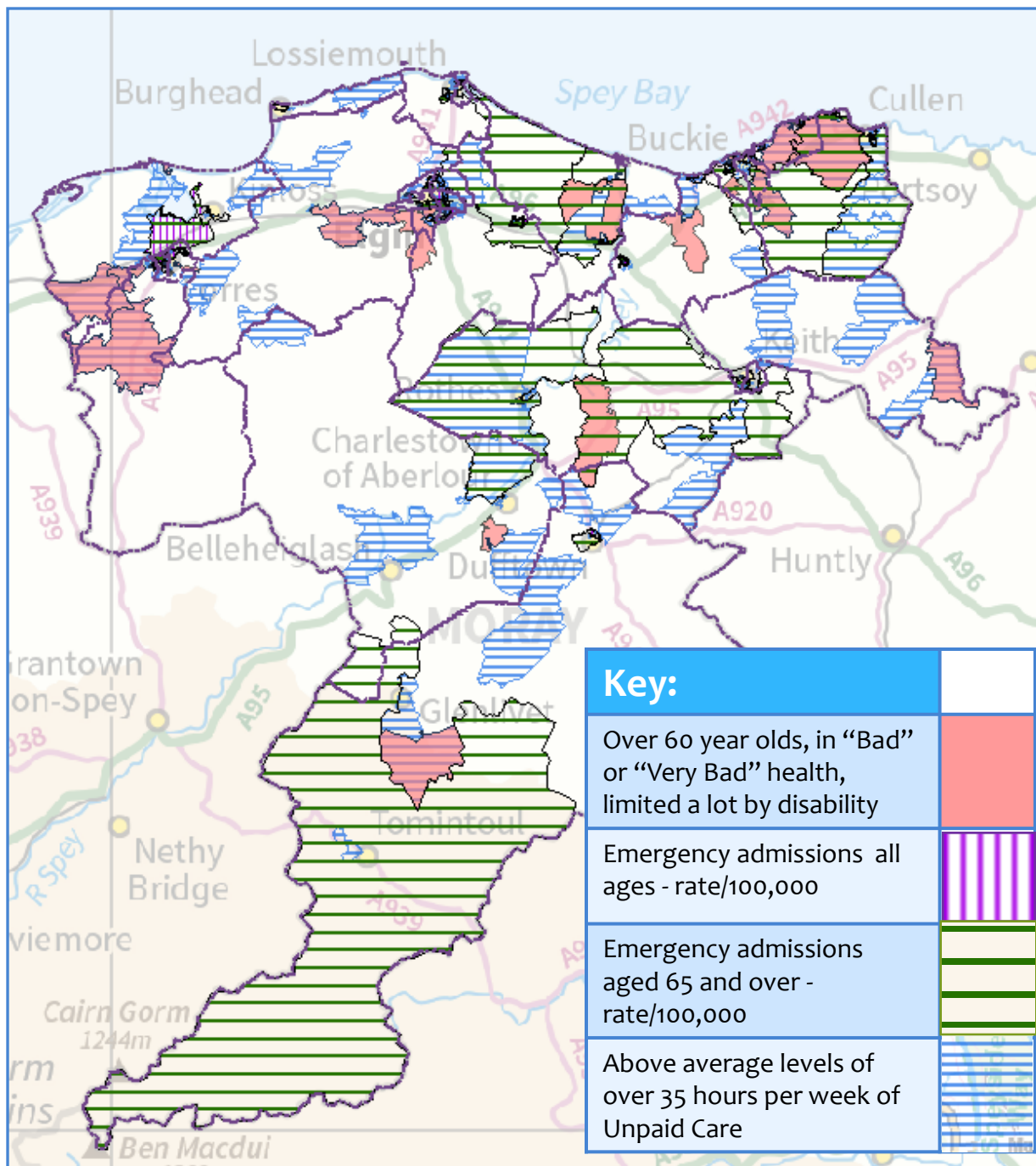

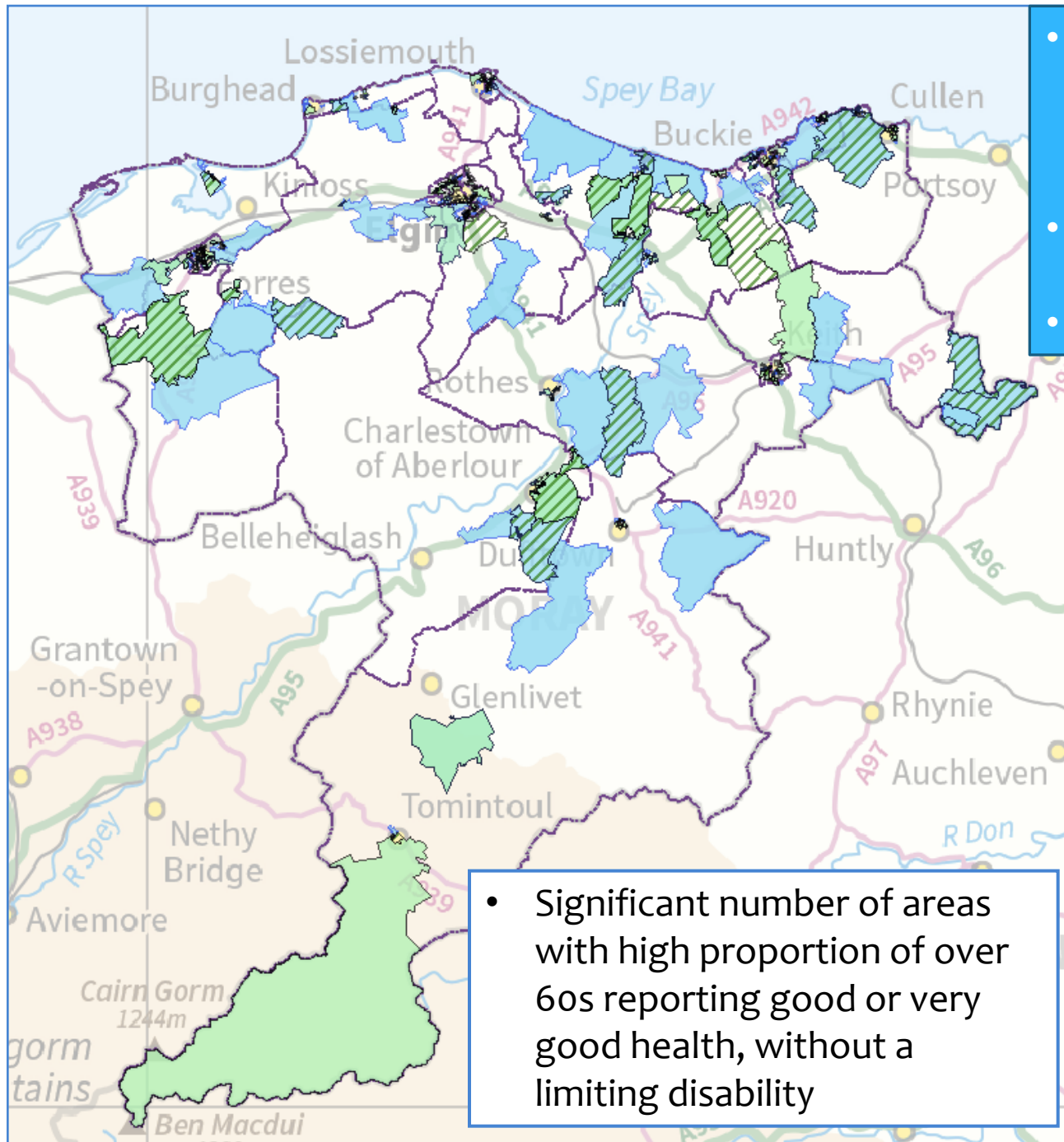






# Which communities report good health amongst older people?





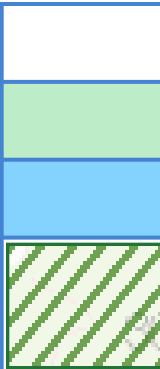
- Locations with above average proportions of :

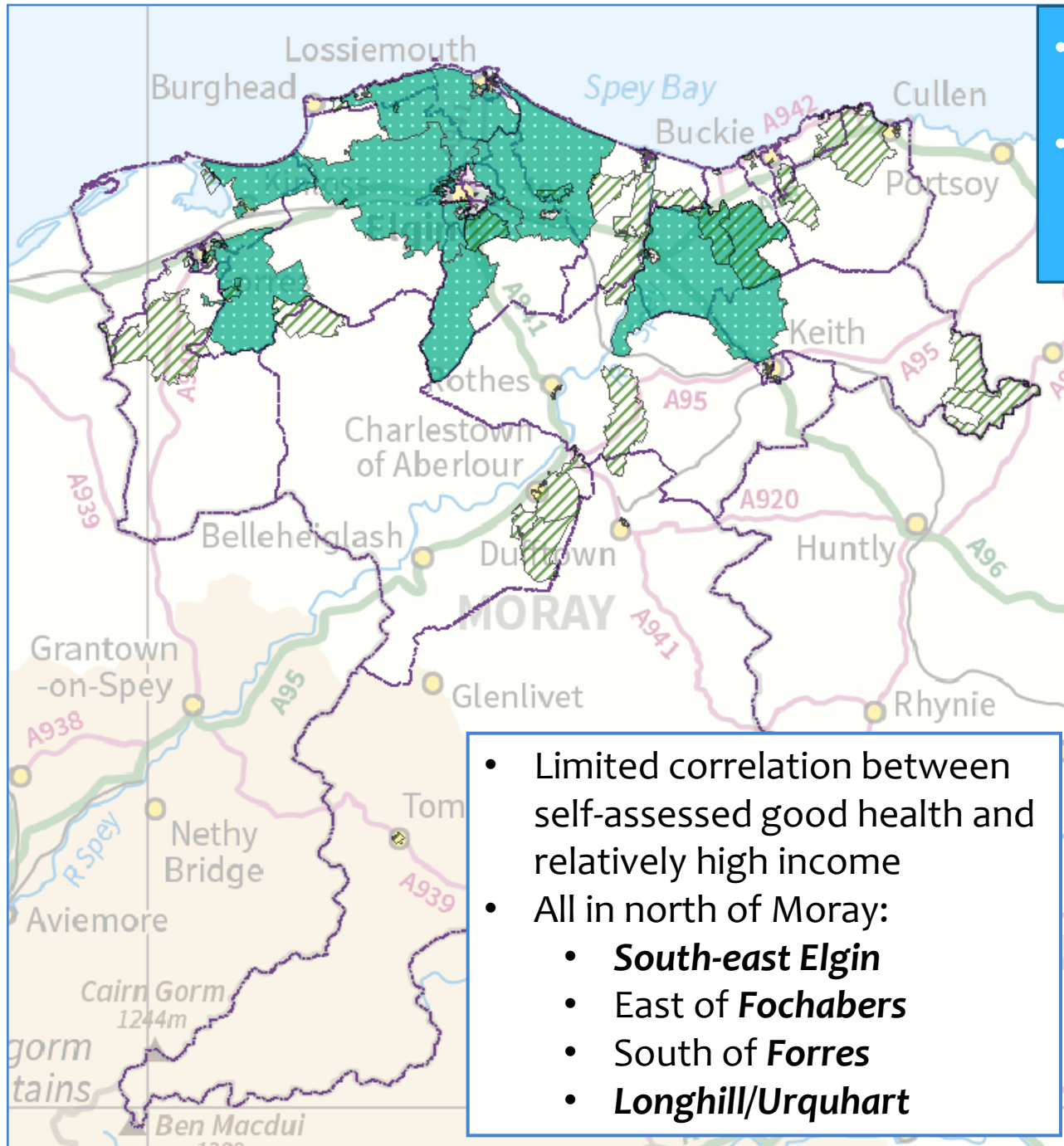
Residents over 60 years old in good health not limited by disability

- Elderly residents reporting good health
- High weekly median income (Top 2 quintiles for Moray)

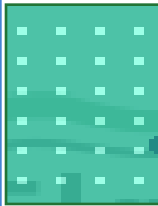
- Limited correlation between self-assessed good health and relatively high income
- All in north of Moray:
  - **South-east Elgin**
  - East of **Fochabers**
  - South of **Forres**
  - **Longhill/Urquhart**

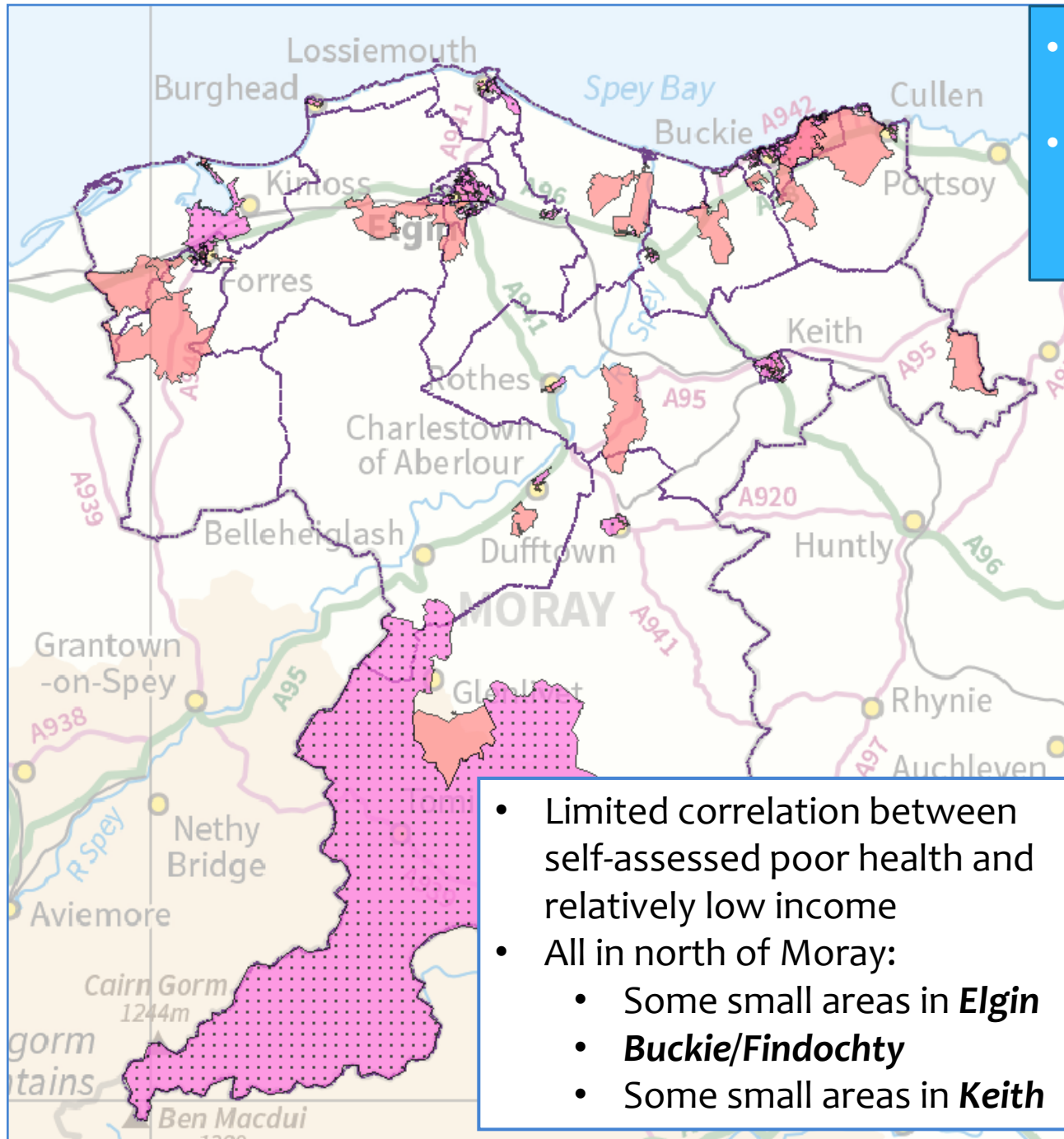

- Low weekly median income (Bottom 2 quintiles for Moray)

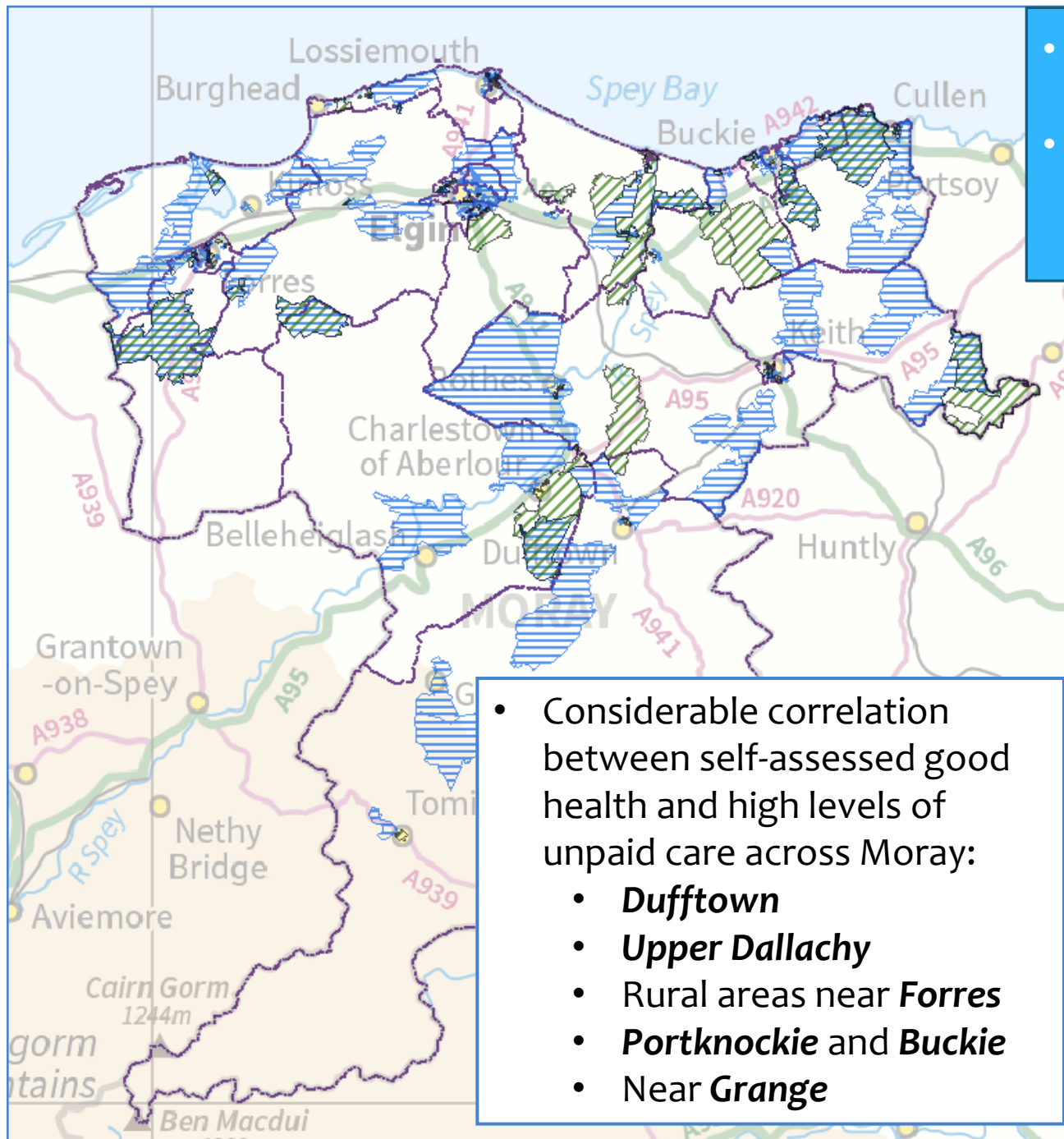
- Limited correlation between self-assessed poor health and relatively low income

# Is perception of good health related to amount of unpaid care?



- Elderly residents reporting good health
- High levels of unpaid care (over 35 hours per week)

- Considerable correlation between self-assessed good health and high levels of unpaid care across Moray:
  - **Dufftown**
  - **Upper Dallachy**
  - Rural areas near **Forres**
  - **Portknockie** and **Buckie**
  - Near **Grange**

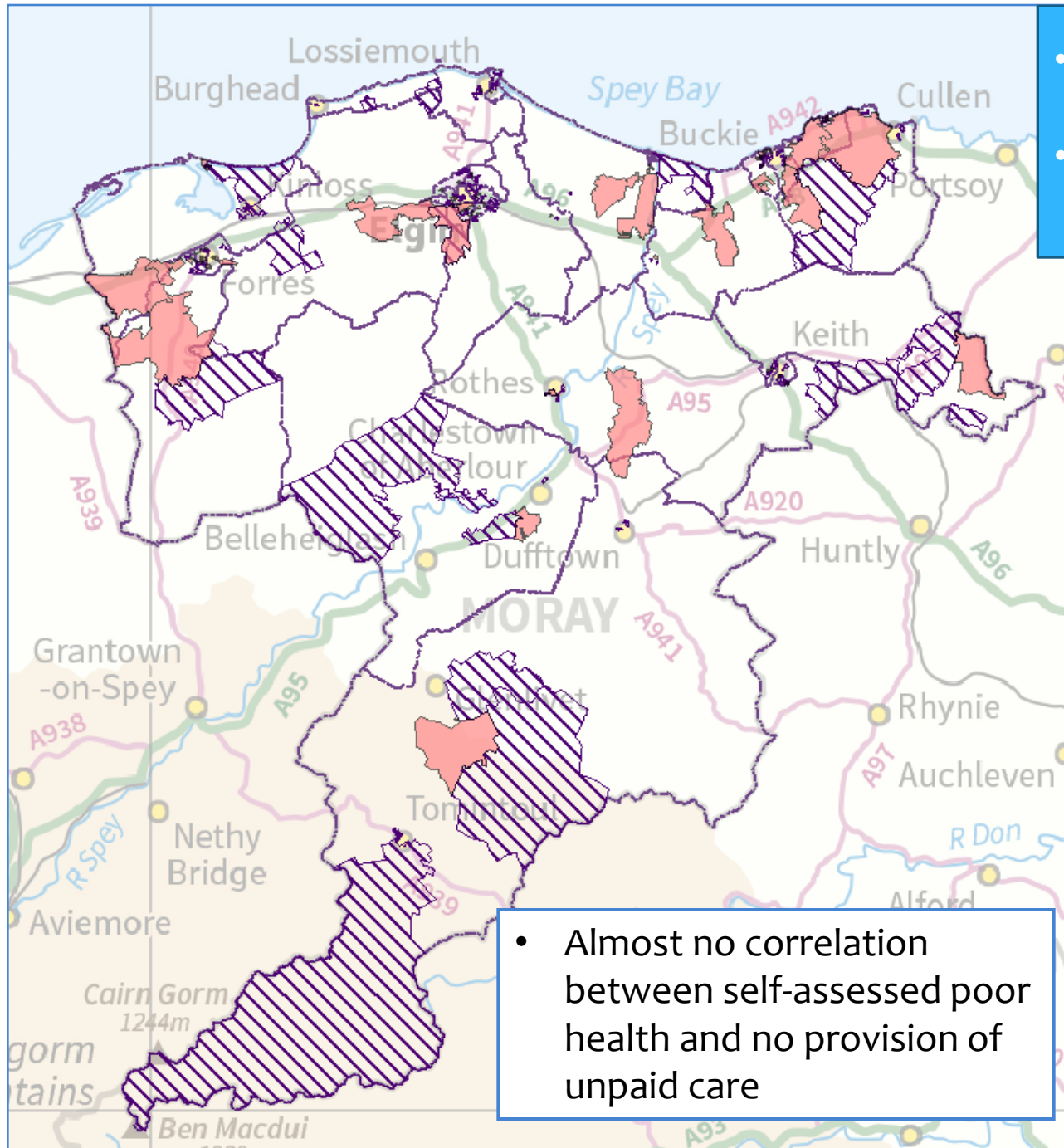

- No unpaid care provided by families and friends

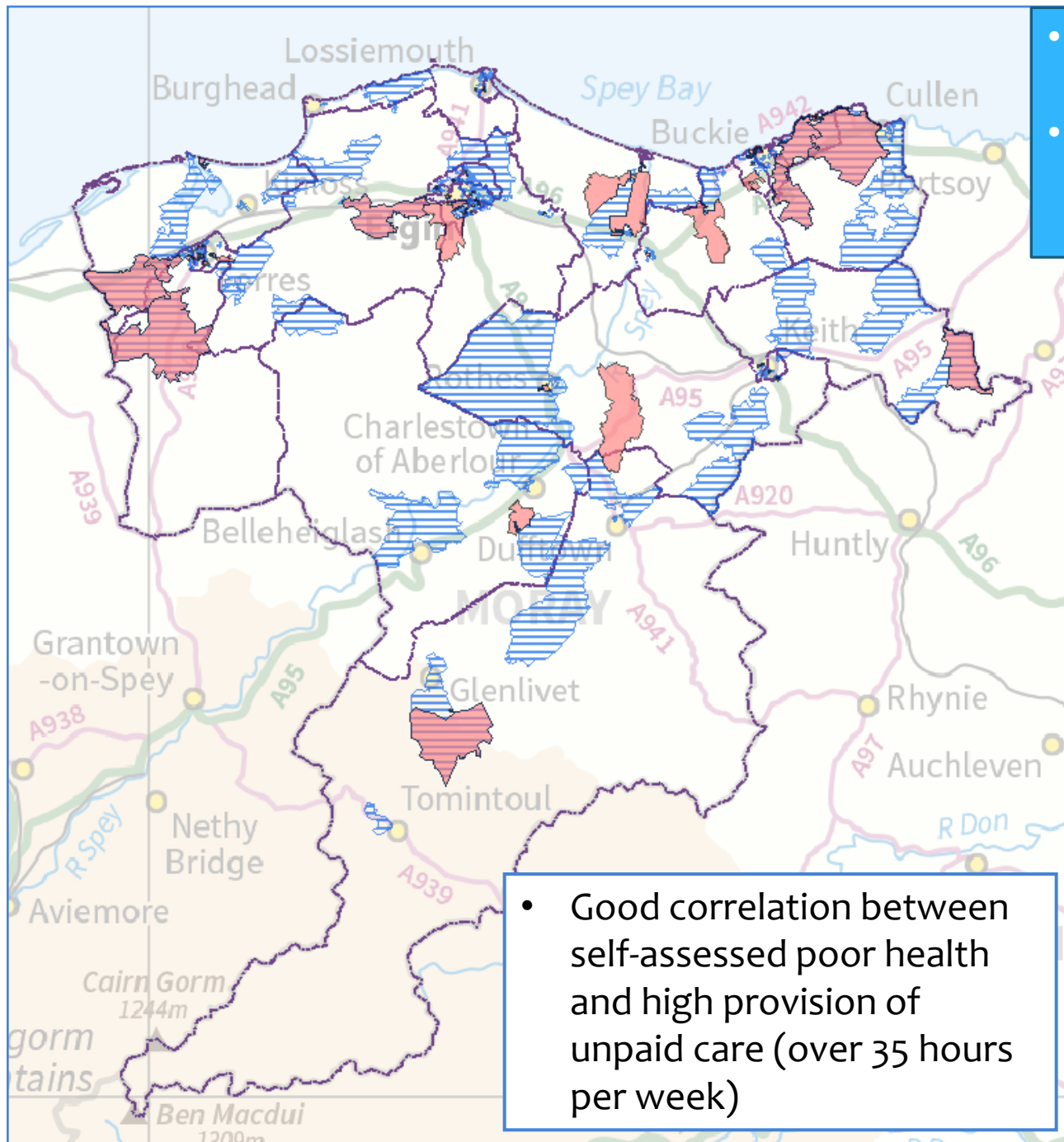

- Good correlation between self-assessed poor health and high provision of unpaid care (over 35 hours per week)

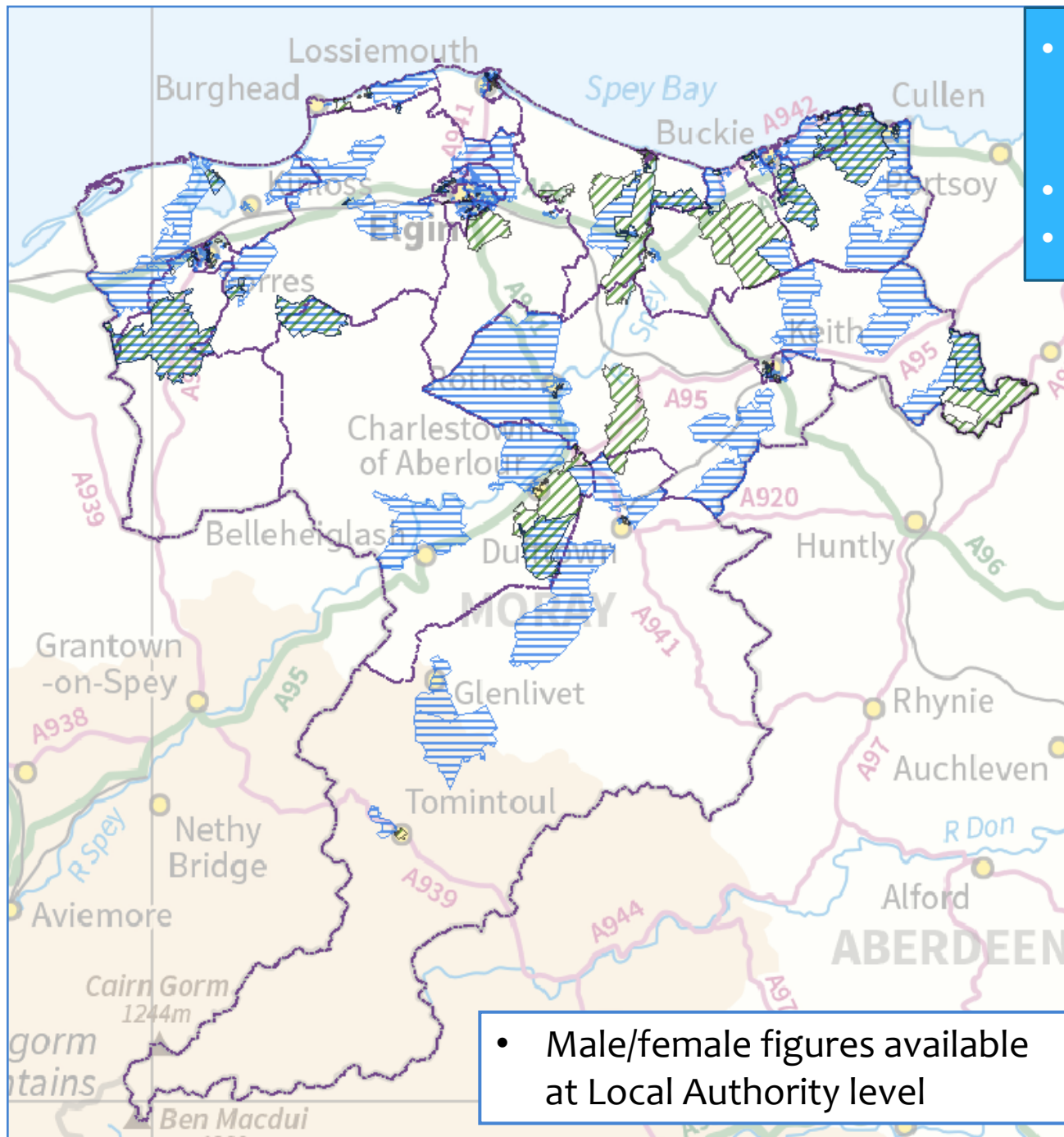

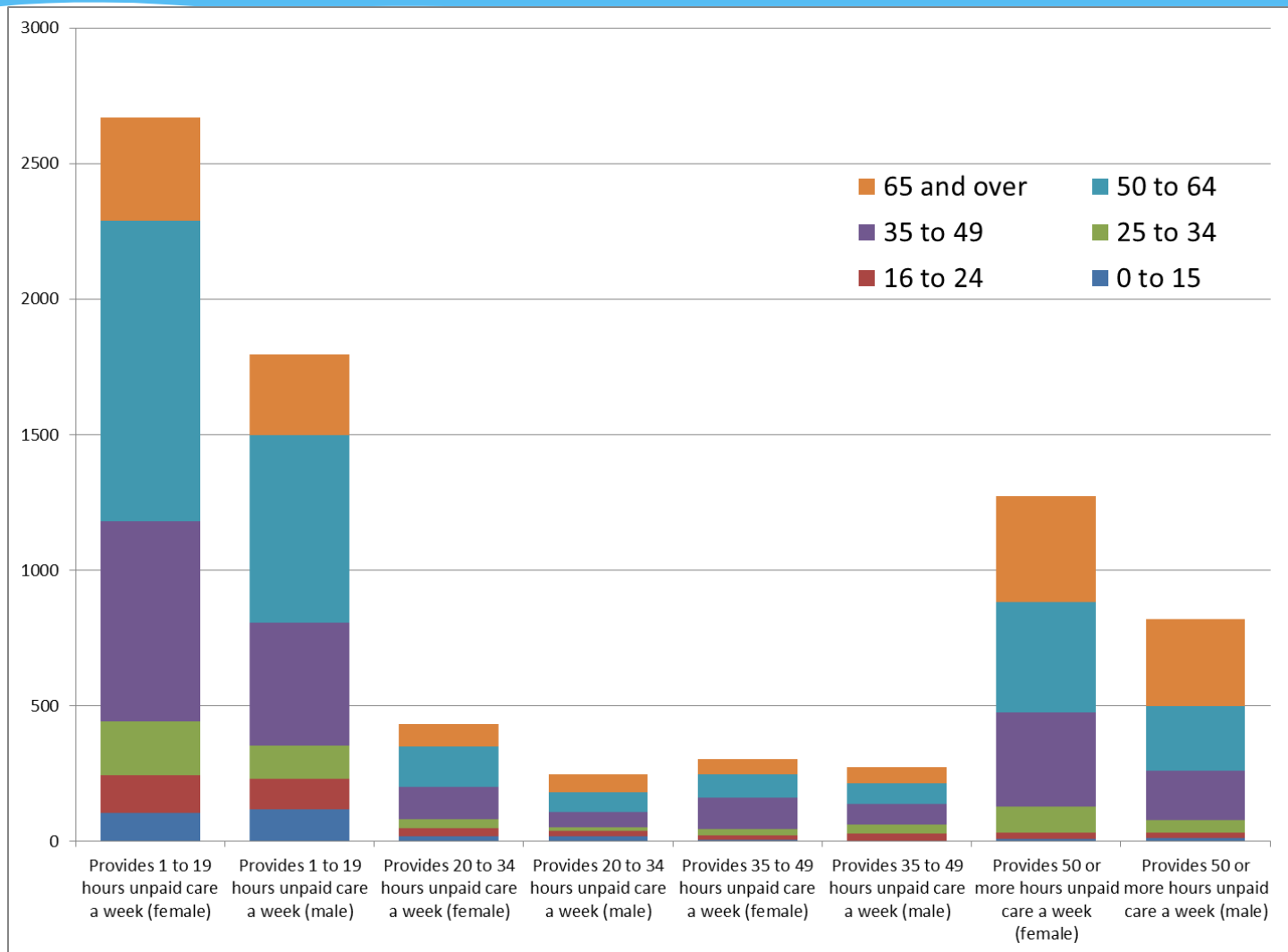

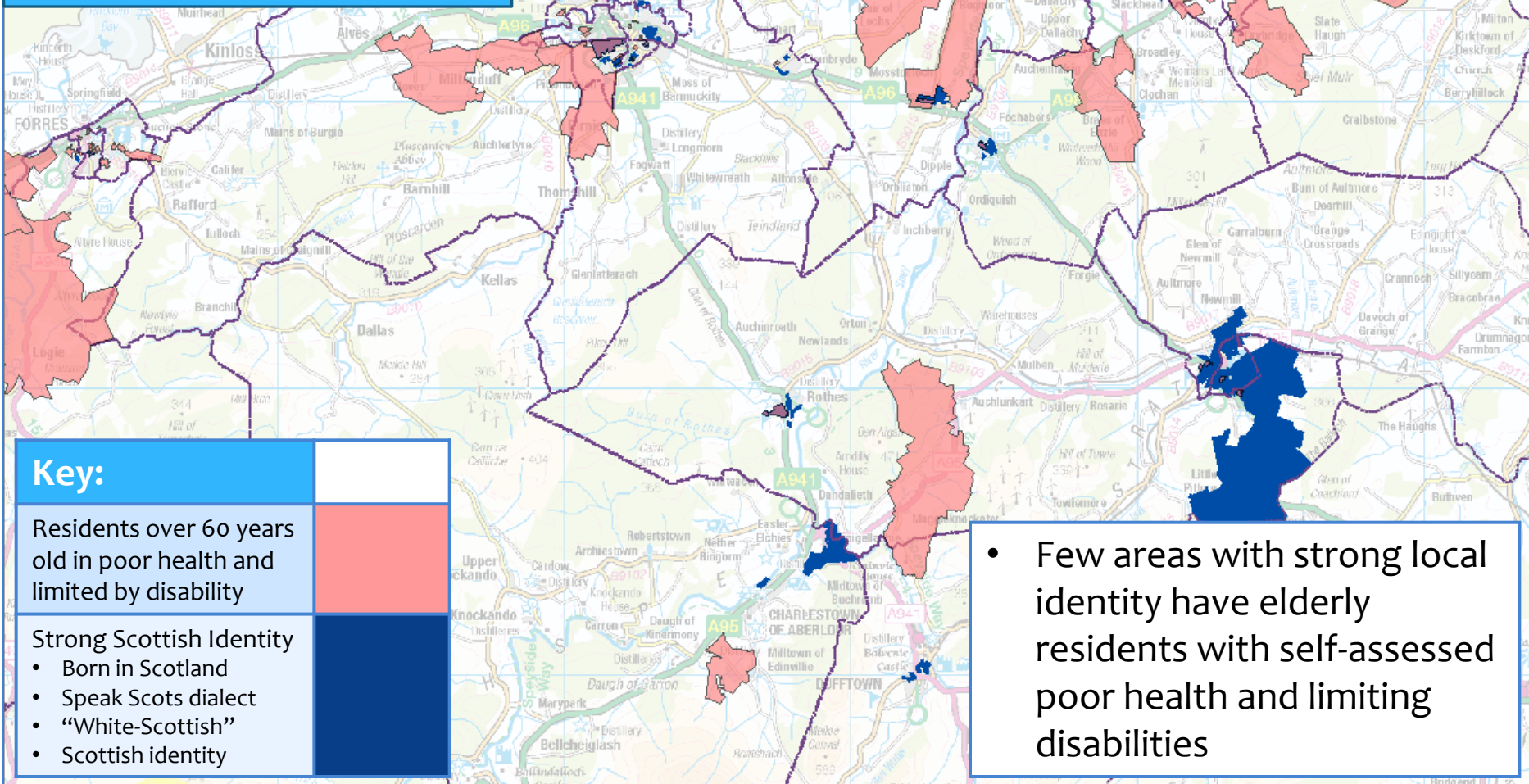
# Data for Moray - Ages of Unpaid Carers



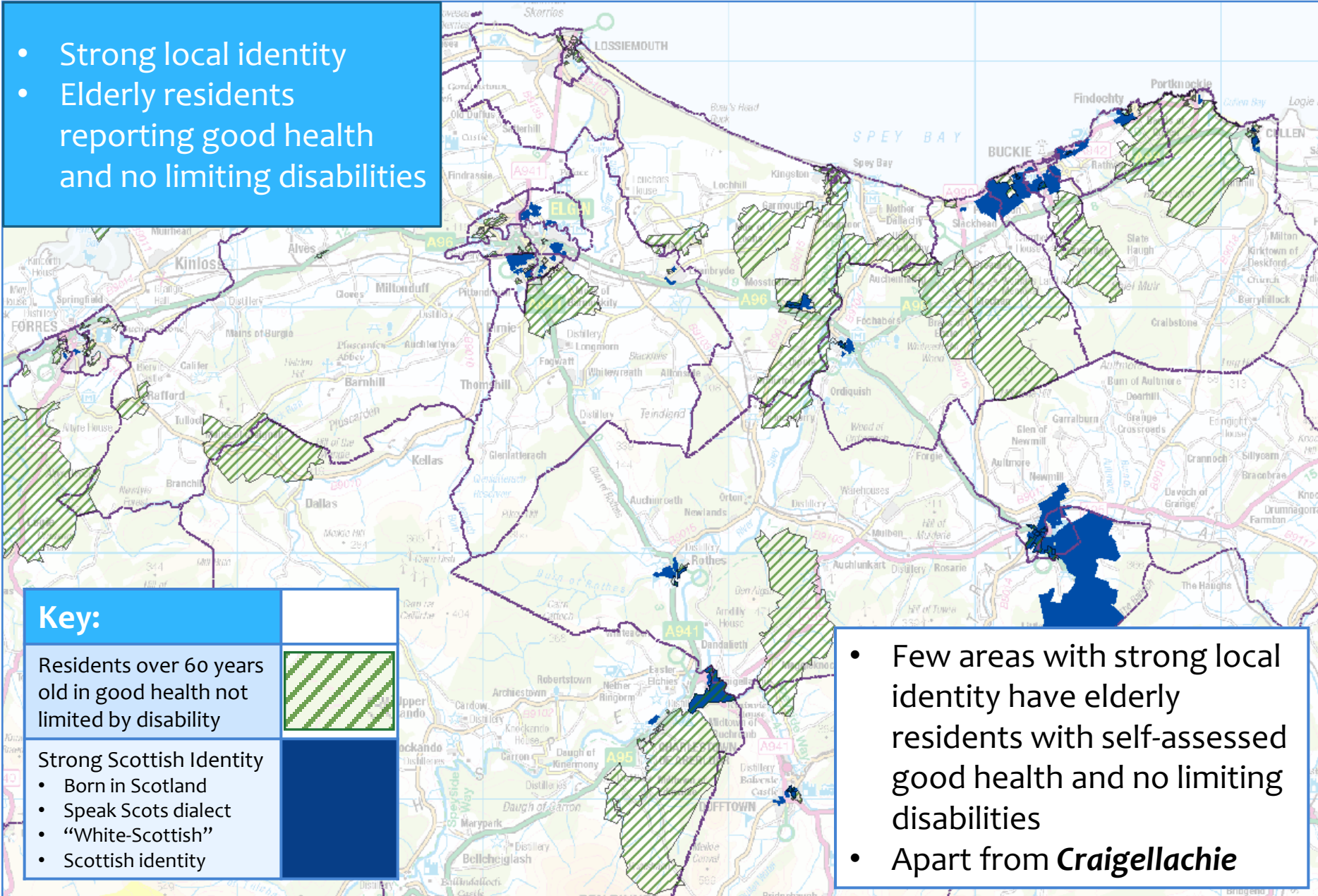


Is perception of good health

- Elderly residents reporting poor health and limiting disabilities



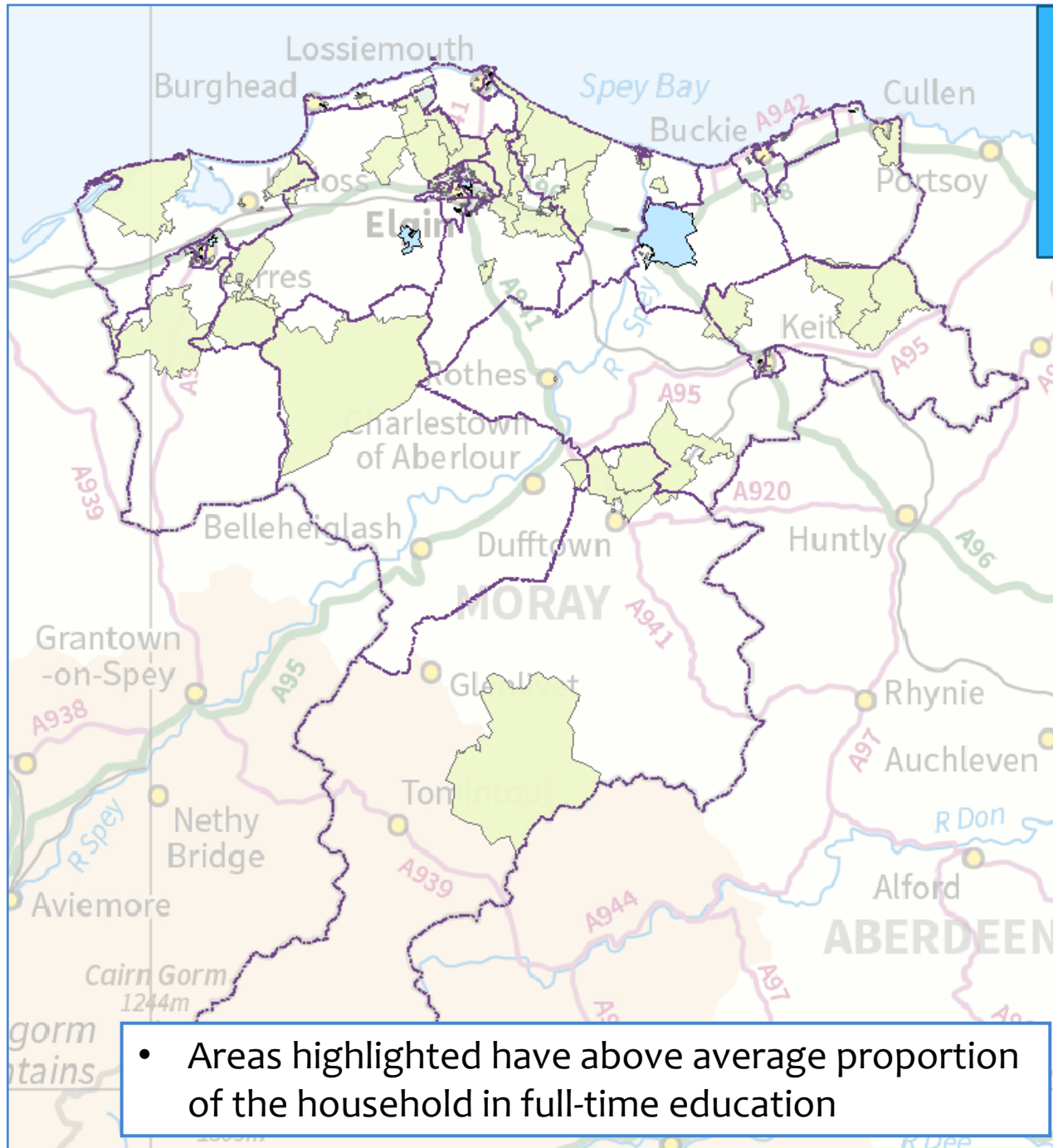
- Strong local identity

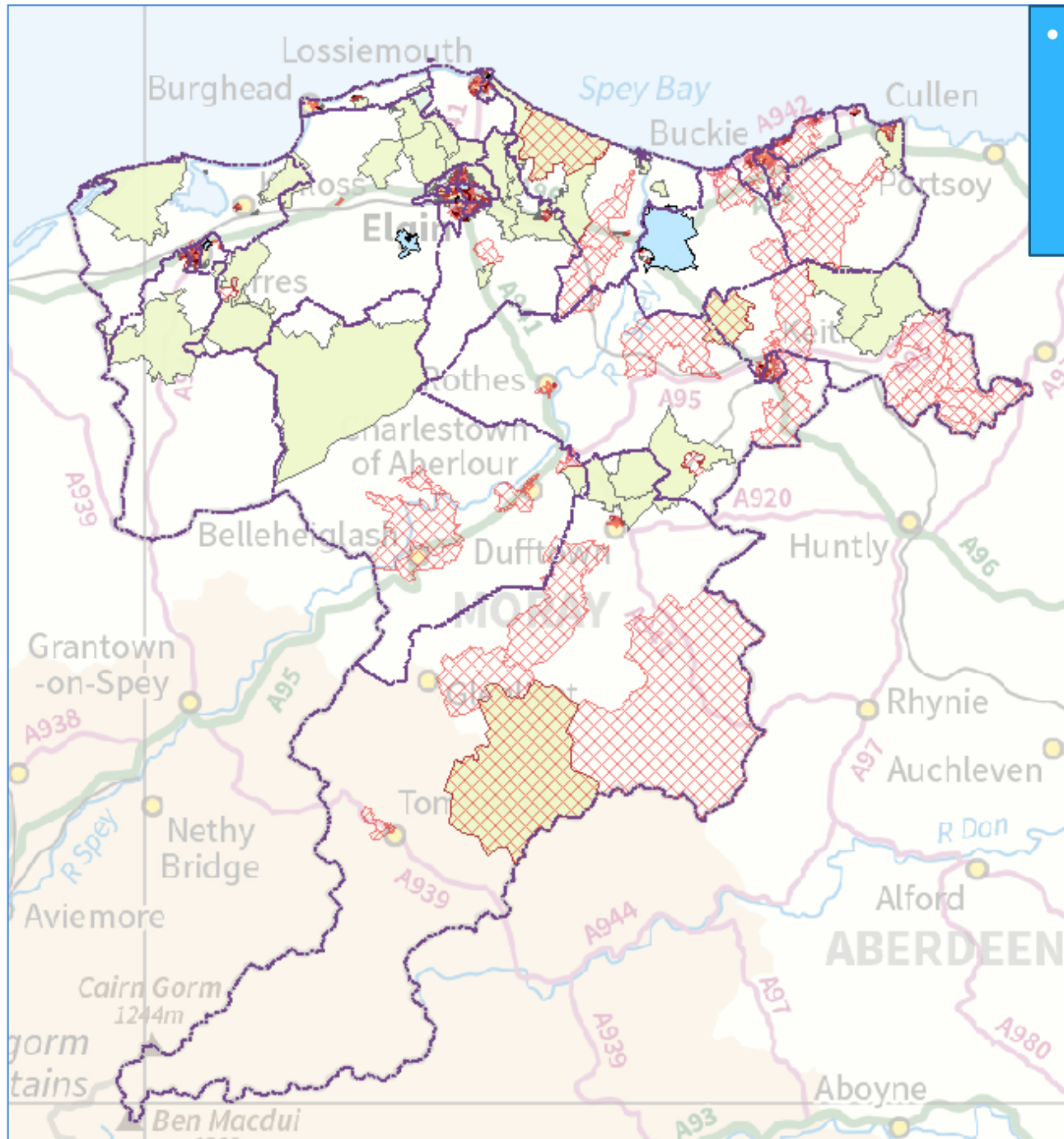

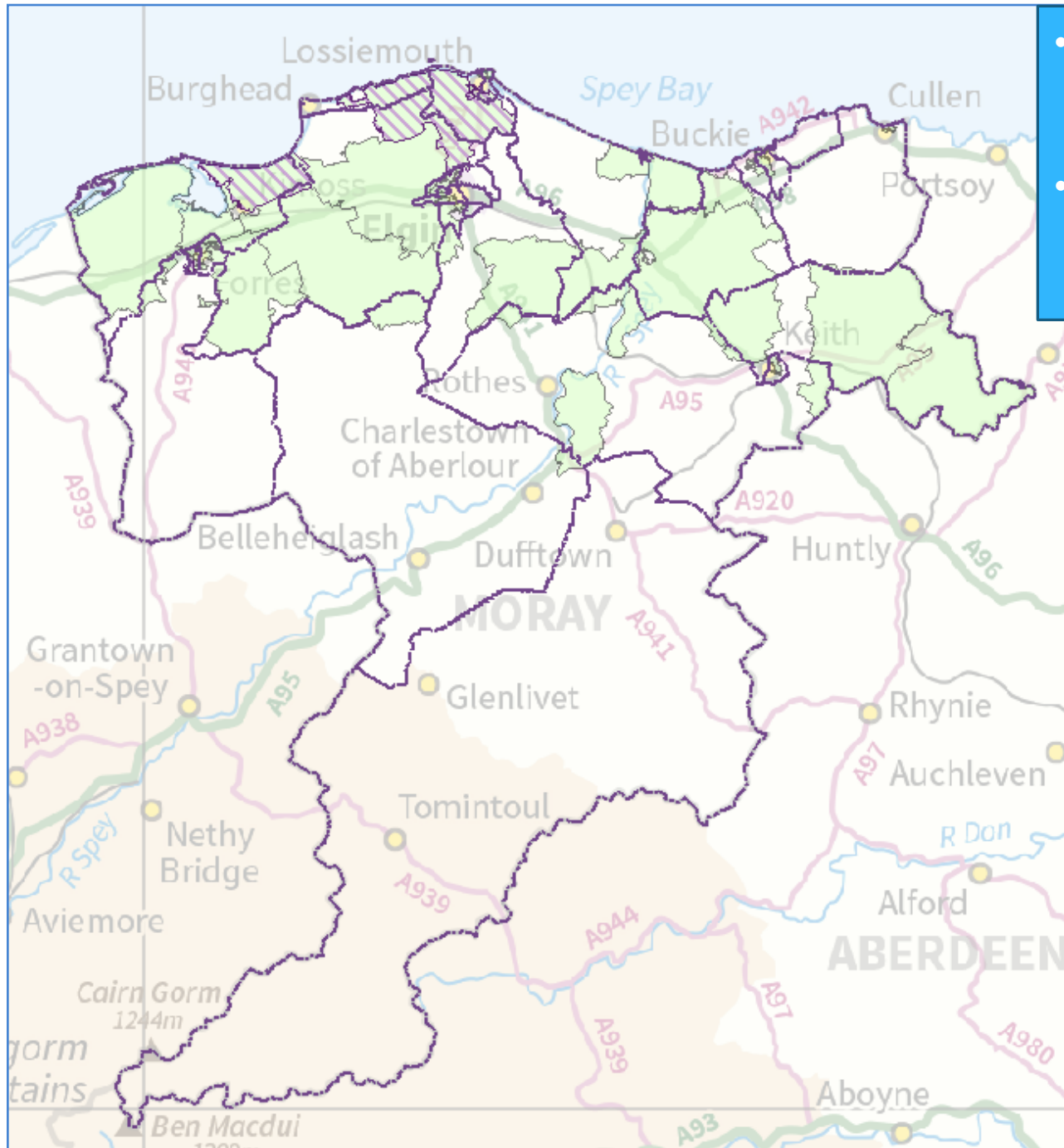

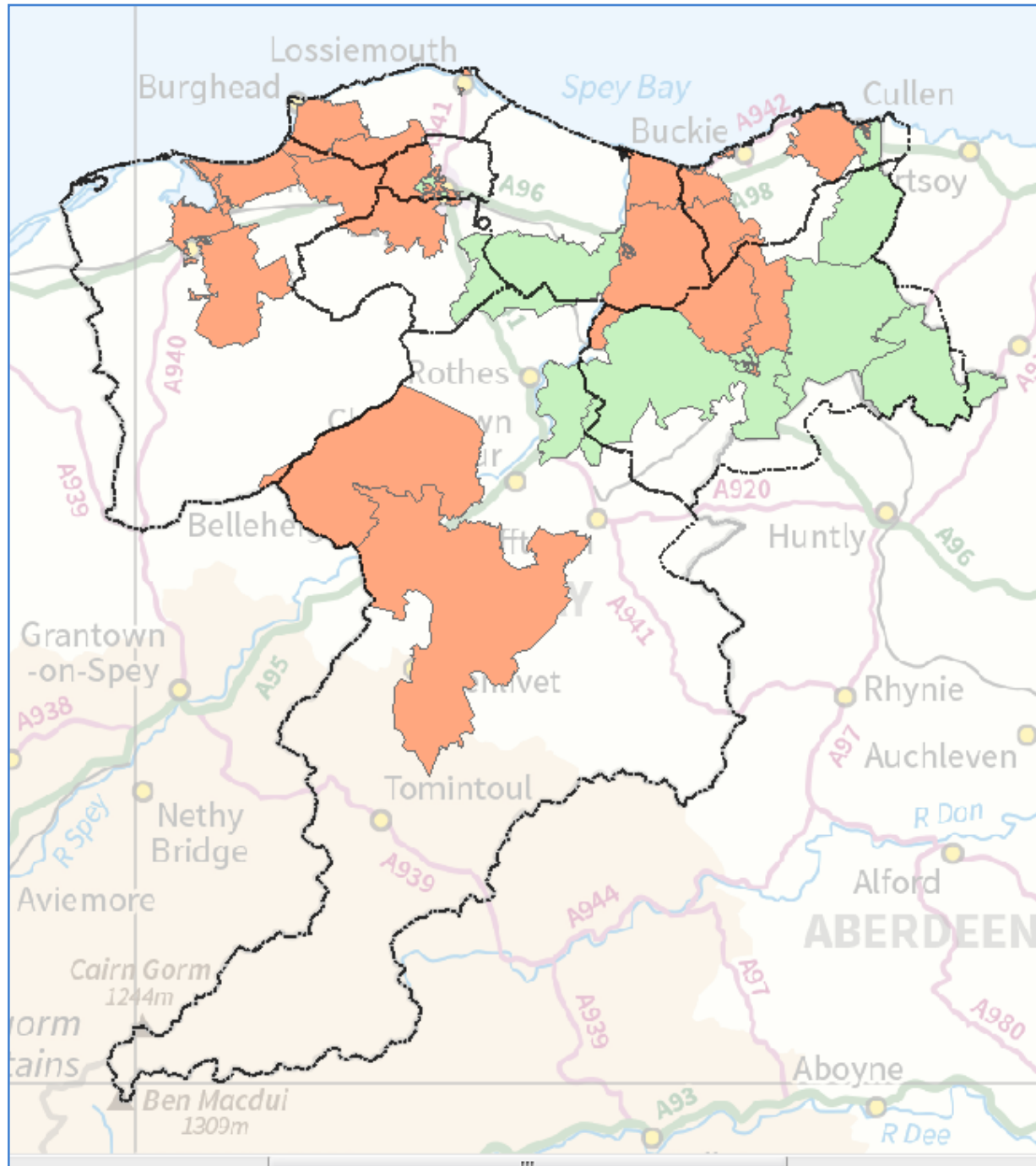

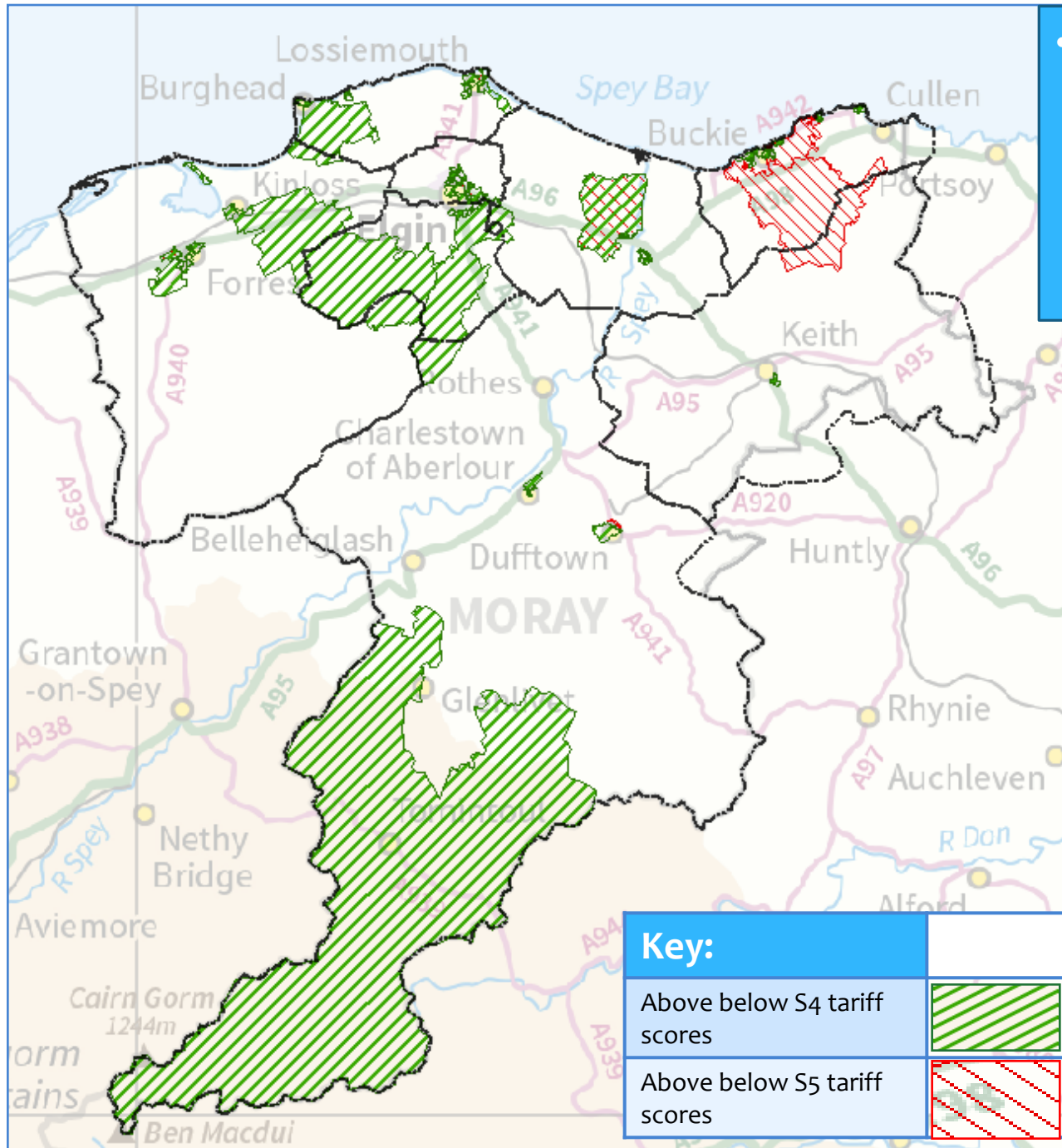

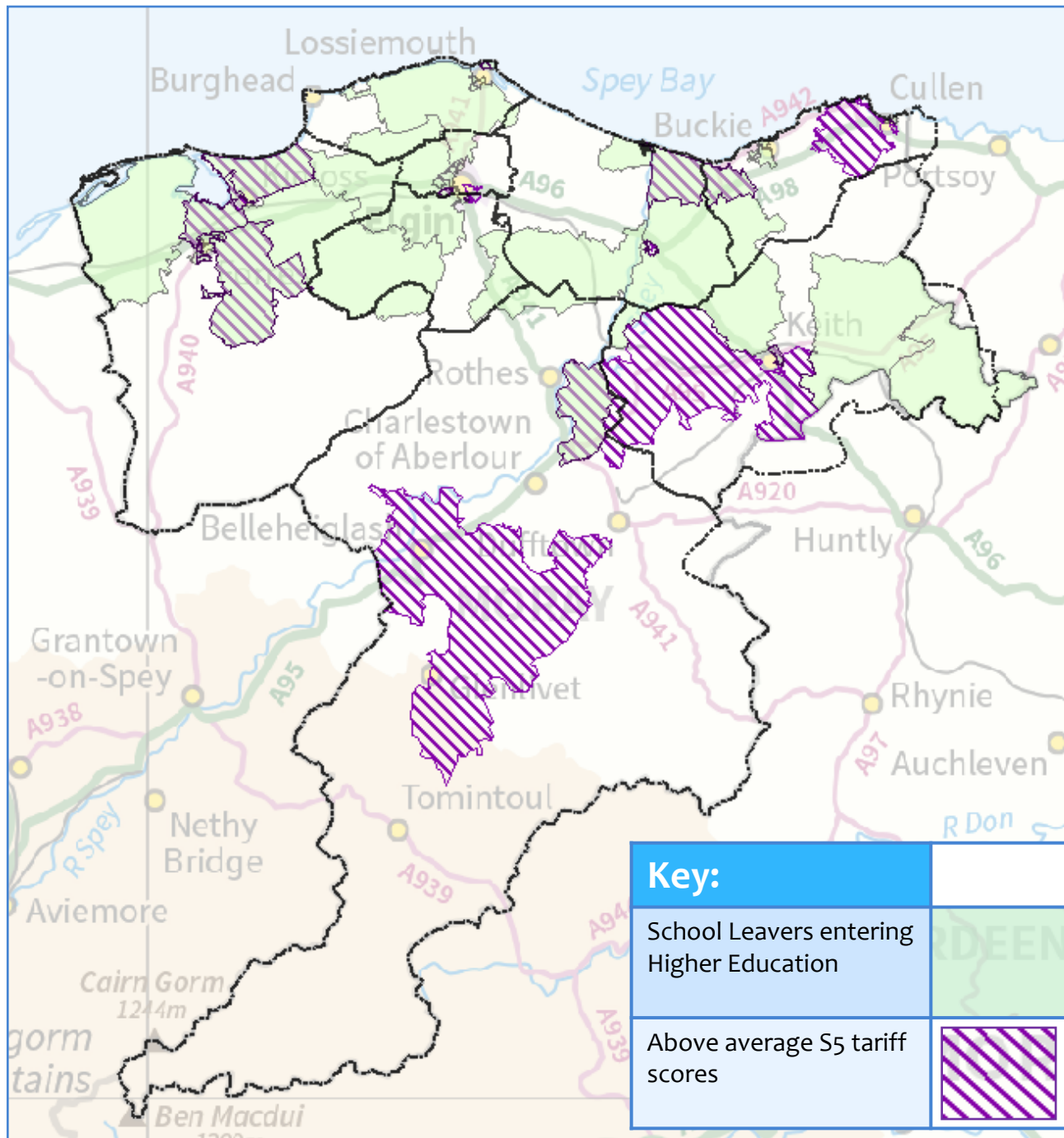

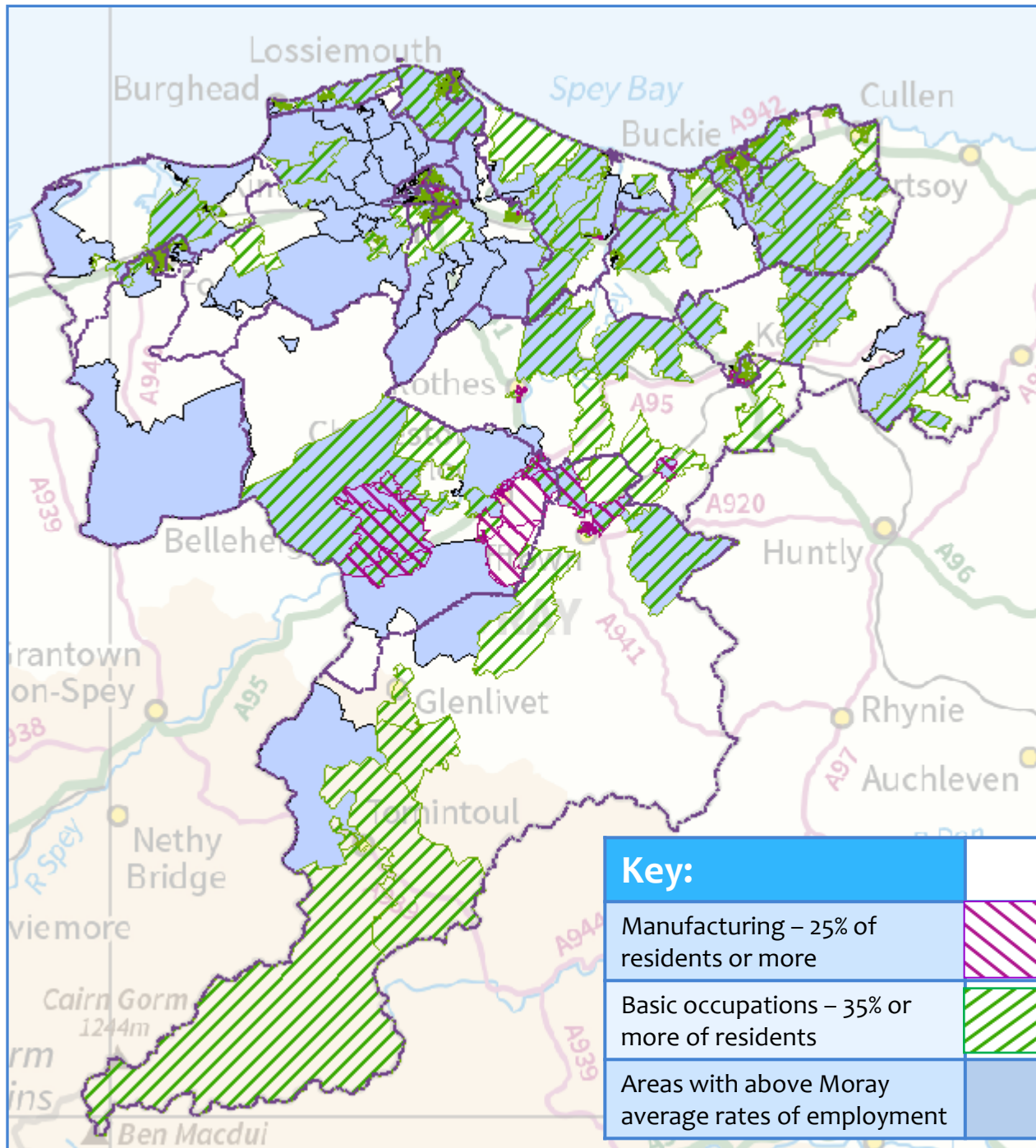

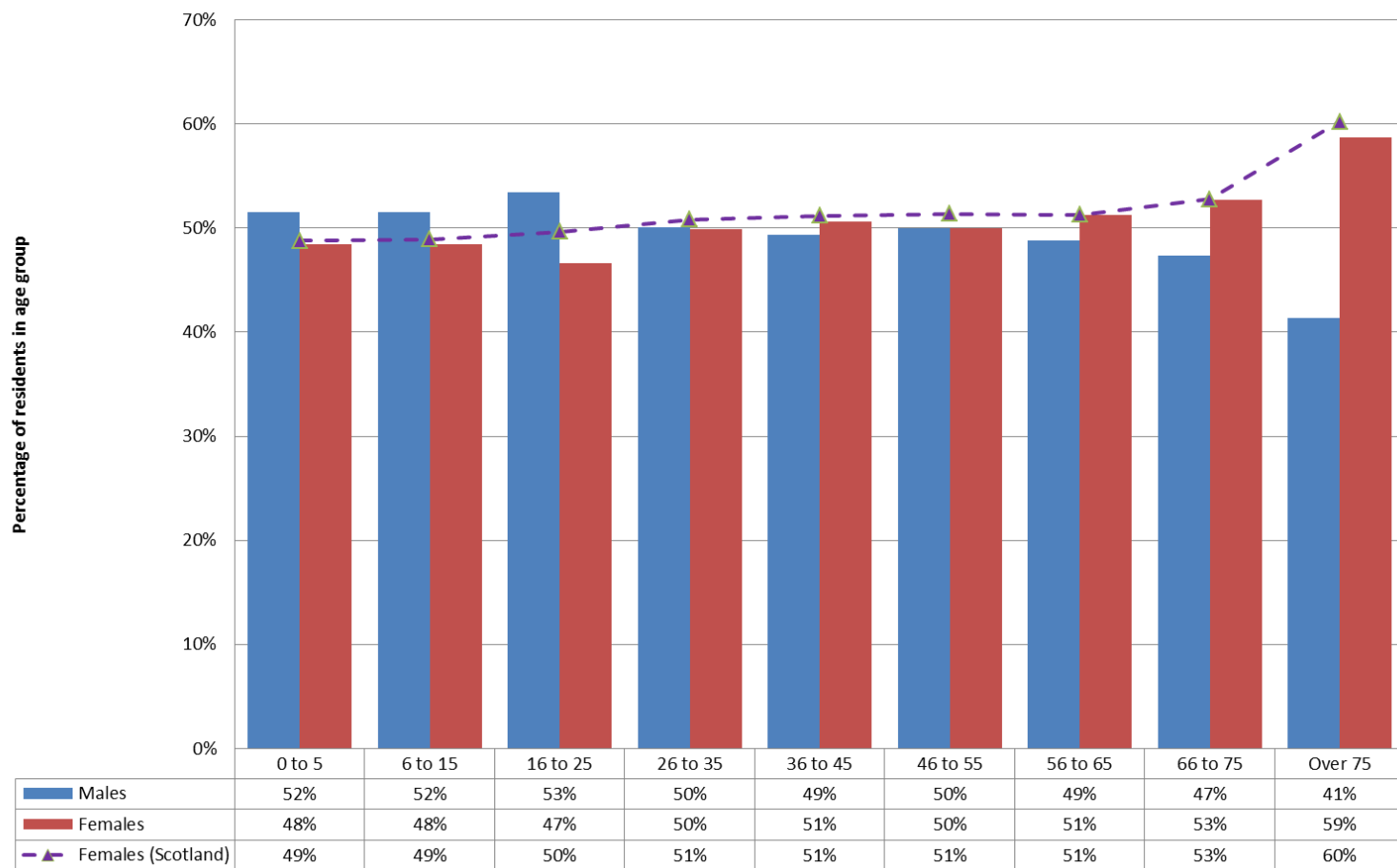

**Proportion of males to females by age group in Moray - 2015 population**







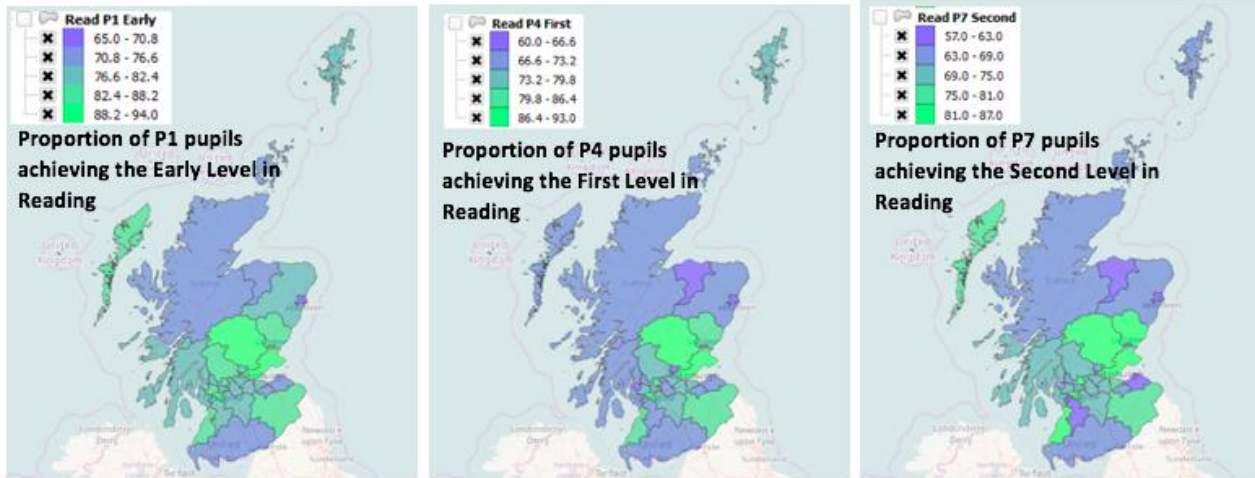

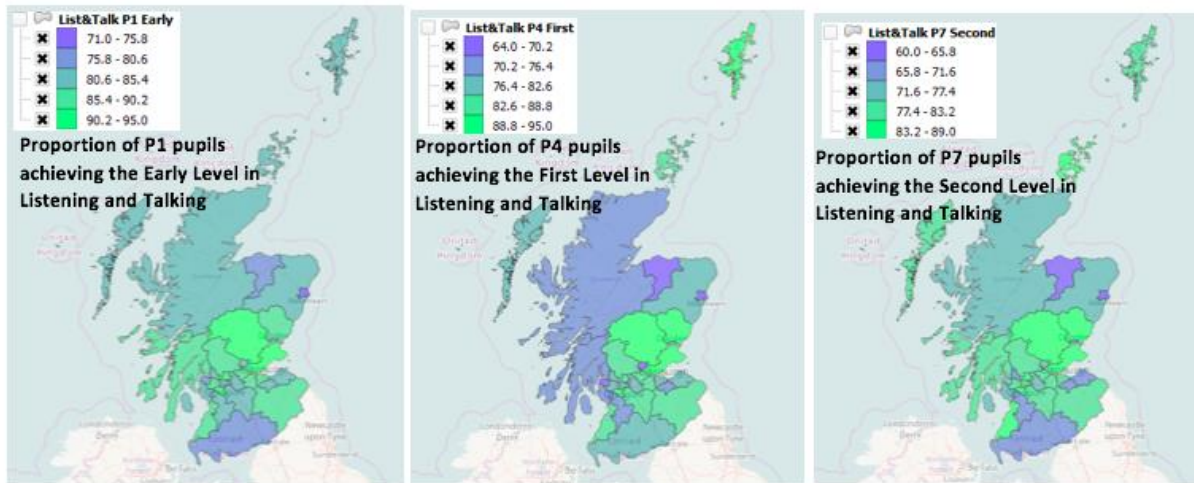
